
Primary Years Curriculum Overview

Structure of the Programme

The Primary Years Curriculum at King's spans Grades 1 through 6, catering to students aged 6 to 11. The curriculum is designed with an interdisciplinary approach, integrating core subjects such as languages, mathematics, social studies, science, arts, and physical, social, and personal education (PSP&E), thereby encouraging students to establish meaningful connections across disciplines. The integration of subject content with "learning how to learn" strategies enables students to develop essential skills in independent planning, self-monitoring, and evaluation.

It facilitates students' comprehension of the rationale behind learning each topic, alongside the knowledge itself. Classroom teachers and specialists collaborate to deliver this balanced, holistic education, empowering students with the competencies needed for lifelong learning and adaptability in a dynamic world.

Core Components
